

SURGICAL DISCHARGE INSTRUCTIONS

Your cat is recovering from major surgery which requires continued nursing care at home in order to ensure a successful outcome. Your job in the recovery period at home is just as important as the procedure we just completed.

Feed a light meal tonight, normal intake tomorrow. Give any prescribed medications as directed. No baths for 2 weeks.

This care at home mainly entails **restriction of activity** because your cat does not understand the significance of the recovery period. It will become very active in a short period of time, and confinement indoors by you is of the utmost importance!

What this means is:

No jumping or running No stair climbing No playing with other pets No "rough-housing"

This strict confinement must be continued during the entire convalescent period. Excessive activity often leads to re-injury or serious complications that result in failure of surgical closure or implants or necessitate corrective surgery. This means additional expense to you and added discomfort to your cat.

Observe the incision daily for signs of redness, swelling, discharge or excessive licking. The incision should look better with each passing day. Please do not hesitate to call if any of the above occur. We have available various sizes of protective collars to keep your dog from licking the incision. Licking usually leads to complications which can occur in a matter of minutes. Call us as soon as possible if this occurs because this can result in an infection that is difficult to treat and may require hospitalization.

In general, your cat should improve gradually each day. If it suddenly worsens please call us as soon as possible. Our goal is to help your dog return to a normal and pain-free life. Please contact our office if there is any straining to urinate or defecate, vomiting or diarrhea, or if still not eating by tomorrow. And please call if you have any concerns.
